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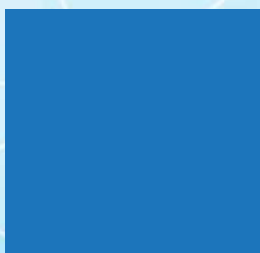

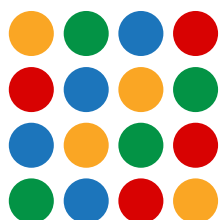


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Foreword

LOCATION & CONNECTIVITY

DoubleTree by Hilton Johor Bahru is located in the city centre within close proximity to key transport links, commercial areas, and Johor Bahru City Square. Its central location provides convenient access for both local and international delegates.



Senai International Airport (JHB), Johor Bahru is the nearest airport to the conference venue. Journey from the airport to the hotel typically takes approximately 30–40 minutes.

Taxi and ride-hailing services are readily available, with estimated fares ranging between RM40 and RM60.

International visitors may also opt to fly into Singapore. From there, the cross-border journey to Johor Bahru typically takes about 1 hour, subject to traffic and immigration clearance conditions.



Participants may travel via ETS from Kuala Lumpur to JB Sentral, located approximately 1 km from the venue. The hotel is about 5 minutes by taxi or a 10–15 minute walk.



Long-distance buses connect major cities across Peninsular Malaysia to Johor Bahru, with varying travel times.

Buses arrive at Larkin Sentral Bus Terminal, from which the venue is approximately 15 minutes away by taxi or Grab.
